## Family Medicine Certification Entry/Re-Entry Process

At the American Board of Family Medicine (ABFM), we recognize family physicians sometimes experience delays in pursuing their initial and continuing board certification goals. The Entry/Re-Entry Process was created to help physicians gain certification after delays of three years or more.

ABFM provides you with a personalized portfolio where you can access the required certification activities for your initial certification or re-entry process, as well as track your ongoing progress toward continuous Family Medicine Certification over your practice lifetime.

## **Certification Entry/Re-Entry Process**

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## **Certification Entry Process**

You have three calendar years following the year in which you complete your residency training to pass the Family Medicine Certification Examination, earn 50 certification activity points, and obtain a medical license. After that, you will be required to complete the Certification Entry Process to take the exam and gain initial certification status prior to your 7-year board eligibility period expiring.

## **Certification Re-Entry Process**

If your certification has been expired for more than three years, you must complete the Certification Re-Entry Process in order to take the exam and gain certification status.
